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
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LATEST NEWS IN DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT

Partnering with area organizations, members of the Lehighon Main Street Steering Committee have been actively hitting the streets, following the recommendations provided by the Smart Growth Grants report (viewable on the Lehighon Borough Webpage). New to the MSSC team is Beth Ann Alboucq, a Graduate Analyst from the Public Administration Department at Kutztown University, who has been brought on to conduct several projects, one of which is the Business Owner Survey. You may have even seen Beth, a former Lehighon resident and past small business owner, going storefront to storefront, meeting with downtown business owners, and gathering their thoughts on doing business in Lehighon. Her work will help Lehighon Borough identify areas of concern to business owners and how to best prioritize future development projects.

In other news, The MSSC kicked off this past holiday season with the rousing success of the 1st Annual Storefront Holiday Decorating Contest. Several Lehighon downtown businesses chose to participate in this event by decorating their shops and storefront windows, creating beautiful seasonally themed displays, and lighting up the streets for the enjoyment of all. Beginning the night of the Tree Lighting Ceremony, and over the following 2 weeks, Lehighon residents were encouraged to “cast their vote” for their favorite displays. The top 6 businesses with the most votes received \$100 off their January electric bills, the prizes donated by the Borough of Lehighon. The winners of this 1st Annual contest were: Ateria’s on First, Blended Bakery, Griff’s Ale Haus & Grille, Jenny’s Sweets and More, Perfect Balance Boutique, and Salon Indigo. These 6 winners, as well as each and every participating business, that took up the challenge, and contributed to lighting up our downtown for the holiday season, has our true and heartfelt appreciation and thanks.

The MSSC has exciting things in store for 2020. The Promotions Committee is spearheading an Easter Decorating Contest. With the support of the business community, a beautiful basket will be awarded to one winner who takes the time to visit the businesses and vote for their favorite storefront. All participating businesses had contributed to the basket. The MSSC sponsored a hand painted plaque painted by local artist Beth Franks. The plaque will be engraved with the winning business name and year of the contest. As an added bonus, the winning business will get to pick a different 2021 holiday when a 2021 Lehighon Main Street decorating contest will take place and the hand painted plaque will then be passed on to next year’s winner.

The Economic Vitality Committee and Beth Alboucq are spearheading the Customer Intercept Survey. Your opinions can help us market the downtown. The survey will be available online and volunteers will be canvassing the downtown to ask you about your visit. We are also in the process of creating a Building and Business Inventory for the downtown district. We continue to work hard to follow the recommendations of our Main Street Specialist.

LEHIGHTON WATER AUTHORITY HYDRANT FLUSHING

Beginning on Tuesday, April 21, 2020 fire hydrants will be flushed in the service area of the Lehigh Water Authority—in Lehigh, Weissport and portions of Mahoning and Franklin Townships. Flushing will be done beginning at 8:00 A.M. and continue until around 3:00 P.M. each day until all hydrants are flushed. Hydrants will not be flushed on Monday's.

Water may be discolored for a short time. This discoloration is not harmful. It is suggested that at this time, you set aside water at night for drinking the next day.

Hydrant flushing is part of our normal operations, in order to keep the system clean for use by our customers.



COMING SOON AUTOMATIC PAYMENTS FOR UTILITY BILLS



The Lehigh Borough Utility Office will begin accepting ACH Payments for Utility Bills in the Spring of 2020. We will be offering the automatic payments based on your billing cycle and anticipate implementation for all accounts to take six months. Forms will be distributed with your monthly bill as your billing cycle is implemented. Forms must be completed in full and filled out legibly in order for data entry. Payments will be withdrawn on the 1st and the 15th of each month dependent on your billing due date. There are no fees associated with the ACH Payments.

We also accept cash, personal checks, money orders, credit card payments and e-checks. Credit Card payments have a fee of 2.95% of the total transaction and E-Checks have a fee of \$1.05.

GRILLING SAFETY

As we approach the summer season, the Lehigh Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to offer some Grilling safety tips provided by the National Fire Protection Association.

General grilling tips

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

Before you use your grill:

- Check the major connection points between the gas (propane) tank hose and the regulator and cylinder, and where the hose connects to the burners. Tighten if loose.
- Check the gas (propane) tank hose for the potential (gas) leaks. To do that:
 - Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose using a brush or spray bottle.
 - Turn the propane tank on. If there is a gas leak, the propane will release bubbles around the hose (big enough to see).
 - If there are no bubbles, your grill is safe to use.
- If there are bubbles, turn off the tank and check connections, then have your grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the leak doesn't stop, call the fire department immediately.

When the grill is on:

- As you are cooking, if you smell gas, turn off the gas tank and burners.
- If the leak stops immediately, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the smell continues, move away from the grill and call the fire department immediately. Do not move the grill.



Charcoal grills:

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
 - Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
 - There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
 - When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Follow these tips will help ensure your summer cook outs are safe and enjoyable.

The Library is BUSY!

Located in the heart of downtown, the Library serves Lehigh and the surrounding areas. We lend books, audiobooks & DVDs and provide access to eBooks and online databases. Throughout the year we present technology classes, story times, STEM programs, summer reading events, crafting programs, author visits and more. We help with job applications, ancestry searches, retrieving online documents, and many other services.

The Library is BUILDING!

WHY: We are expanding to meet the community's needs. Library visits have grown from 20,278 in 2017 to 27,886 in 2018 to 31,595 in 2019. We now serve an average of 100 people a day. Items borrowed in 2019 totaled 22,209, which is 4,598 more items than the year before. The number of programs presented and the number of computer users we've accommodated has also increased.

WHAT & WHERE: The Library opened on August 14, 1948 as a memorial to the soldiers who died for our country. The current building was constructed in 1966 and measures 2300 square feet. We are building a 1433 sq. ft. addition to the rear of the existing library.

- **Accessibility:** A remodeled front entrance and ADA compliant restrooms with facilities that will accommodate families as well as those with mobility and/or health issues and other considerations.

- **Kid Space:** An open room with furnishings that adapt to different activities and age groups. Large programs and small groups will be accommodated using traditional materials as well as the latest technology. Moving the children's books into this area will free up space in the existing library, resulting in more comfortable areas for all!

- **Gathering Place:** An enclosed space for programs, quiet study, tutoring, and other activities. It will have a kitchenette, storage, and a tile floor to facilitate creative (sometimes messy) pursuits. Community groups will be encouraged to use the space for meetings, classes, and other functions.

WHEN: We broke ground in January and hope to cut the ribbon this summer!

HOW: The Library's Board of Trustees and staff have been working toward this goal for many years and we now have the means to get the project off the ground!

- Local funds for the project have been acquired through bequests and other generous gifts over the past several years.

- The Library Director and Board of Trustees continually apply for grants. In 2018 the library was awarded a large matching grant from the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund through the Office of Commonwealth Libraries.

- We are also conducting a Capital Campaign to help us furnish and equip the new addition and to replace the matching funds in our operating reserve to ensure the library's continued success. If you are interested in making a permanent contribution to the community, all donors will be recognized in the new addition:

- There are significant naming opportunities available including the Community Room, local history section and children's STEM lab.

- Donor recognition may include individual plaques on equipment or furnishings.

- For donations of \$100 to \$499 a leaf, engraved as you wish, will be placed on the Giving Tree in the new addition. Gifts of \$500 or more will be represented by an apple on the tree

- Contributions of all sizes will be listed in a program booklet which will be distributed at the ribbon cutting ceremony and a book listing all donors will be available at the Library thereafter.

WHO: You! We'd love to welcome you to the Library so you can discover everything we have to offer! With extra space and updated accommodations we'll add new activities for children and adults, including concerts, speakers, arts programs and more! With an enclosed, tech ready area we'll host larger computer classes, job skills workshops, makerspaces, and many other programs that benefit our community! All of this is free with your library card, which is also free!

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



Street sweeping begins in March and continues to the end of November, weather permitting. First Street is swept every Wednesday from 4:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. There is NO PARKING allowed during this time. Please look for orange NO PARKING signs on all other streets for street sweeping. Please do not move cars back until signs are removed.

Please do not place yard waste in gutters. There is a black dumpster behind the Public Works garage for your convenience to place yard waste. Please do not deposit stumps or branches larger than four (4) inches in diameter into dumpster. Please do not place yard waste in other dumpsters located on Borough property.

Please do not dump anything into gutters as it will flow to our drains, which lead to our waterways.

TOGETHER we can keep our waterways clean for the future generations!

The 2020 Street Paving Program has been presented to Borough Council. The following streets have been proposed for paving with the use of local forces:

- o Cypress Street
- o North 5th Street
- o Millway
- o 2nd Street Shoulder from Alum to Iron

Completion of the paving will be dependent on fund availability, weather and project coordination. The 2020 Alley Paving Program will be evaluated by Council in the late Spring.

Did you know?

Street Paving is paid from Liquid Fuels Revenues provided by the Commonwealth. Alley paving is not covered by Liquid Fuels and must be paid from the General Fund.



MS4 PUBLIC HEARING

June 1st, 2020, 7:00p.m. @ Municipal Building

Test your knowledge of best Stormwater Management Practices

In order to improve the quality of the water that enters the Chesapeake Bay, Lehighton Borough is part of the federally and state mandated MS4 Program. The ultimate goal of the program is to collect stormwater runoff and to reduce the discharge of pollutants into water sources within the Borough. As a Borough resident you can help to improve water quality. Which of the following practices should you incorporate to achieve the MS4 goal? Check your understanding of stormwater management by taking the following quiz.

1. Sharpen mower blades once a year to avoid damaging grass blades.....T F

All of the above statements are true! Now that you are aware of some of the best practices for improving water quality, we hope that you will consider implementing some that you currently may not be doing. Remember that better water quality is everyone's responsibility.



For many of us, water activities equal fun. But it's important to be aware of electrical hazards while enjoying the water. Know how to be safe around swimming pools, hot tubs, and spas.

KNOW THE RISKS!

Electrocution is death by an electrical shock. Be aware when skin is wet or when surrounding surfaces, such as the grass or pool deck, are wet. Wet skin or wet surfaces can greatly increase the chance of electrocution when electricity is present.

There are several signs of electrical shock. Swimmers may feel a tingling sensation. They may experience muscle cramps. They may not be able to move. They may feel as if something is holding them in place.

If you think someone in the water is being shocked, turn off all power, but do not attempt to go in the water. Use a fiberglass or other kind of rescue hook that doesn't conduct electricity to help the swimmer. Have someone call 9-1-1.

If you think you are being shocked while in the water move away from the source of the shock. Get out of the water.

- If you are putting in a new pool, hot tub, or spa be sure the wiring is performed by an electrician experienced in the special safety requirements for these types of installations.
- Outdoor receptacles must have covers that keep them dry even when appliances are plugged into them.
- Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) are special devices designed to protect against electric shock and electrocution. They are required for most pool, spa or hot tub equipment. They may be in the form of an outlet or a circuit breaker. Test the GFCIs monthly according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Electrical appliances, equipment, and cords should be kept at least 6 feet away from the water. When possible, use battery operated appliances and equipment, such as televisions, radios, and stereos.
- Avoid handling electrical devices when you are wet.
- Make sure that any overhead lines maintain the proper distance over a pool and other structures, such as a diving board. If unsure, contact a qualified electrician or your local utility company to make sure power lines are a safe distance away.
- Do not swim during a thunderstorm.
- Have a qualified electrician periodically inspect and—where necessary—replace or upgrade the electrical devices or equipment that keep your pool, spa, or hot tub electrically safe.
- Have a qualified electrician show you how to turn off all power in case of an emergency.

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Who Needs Building Codes?

We all do – whether in our homes, offices, schools, stores, factories or places of entertainment. We rely on the safety of structures that surround us in our everyday life. The public need for protection from disaster due to fire, structural collapse and general deterioration underscores the need for modern codes and their administration. Most aspects of building construction (electrical wiring, heating, sanitary facilities) can represent a potential hazard to building occupants and users. Building codes provide safeguards. Although no code can eliminate all risks, reducing risks to an acceptable level helps.

Who is Lehigh County's Codes Enforcer?

Barry Isett and Associates, Inc. is the appointed Building Code Official, Zoning and Code Enforcement Officer for Lehigh County, appointed in 2013. As certified inspectors, our responsibility is the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the public by creating safe buildings and communities. This is accomplished through the enforcement of federal, state and local ordinances adopted by the County.

We take pride in providing a professional level of assistance to the community. Enforcement often begins with a written letter (Notice of Violation) to identify items that are out of compliance, the code requirement, a timeframe for completion and a fine if no action is taken to abate the issues. These items are required to be listed in the notice and may seem overwhelming and are often interpreted as demanding and offering no help. In fact, that is not the case. The County wants compliance with codes to ensure health and safety for the community. Isett will work with you throughout the process and provide guidance. Cooperation on your part is needed in order to achieve a successful completion of the project.

Property Maintenance and Quality of Life (QOL)
