



Similar to the existing 21 foot by 30-foot pavilion, the new larger pavilion will be a joint effort between the Pool Pals and the borough. The borough will handle the installation of the concrete pad and supplying electric to the pavilion. The Pool Pals will cover the cost of the remaining structure. Any individual or company donating a minimum of \$250.00 towards the cost of the pavilion will receive their name engraved on a plaque that will be permanently and proudly displayed in the new pavilion.

Along with planning for the pavilion, the Pool Pals have also updated their summer event schedule to include a summer fun event tribute/celebration honoring lifetime Pool Pals member Linda Schoenberger who recently passed to life eternal. LEHIGHTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

As we approach the summer season, the Lehigh Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to offer some Grilling safety tips provided by the National Fire Protection Association.

GENERAL GRILLING TIPS:

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

BEFORE YOU USE YOUR GRILL:

- Check the major connection points between the gas (propane) tank hose and the regulator and cylinder, and where the hose connects to the burners. Tighten if loose.
- Check the gas (propane) tank hose for the potential (gas) leaks. To do that:
 - Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose using a brush or spray bottle.
 - Turn the propane tank on. If there is a gas leak, the propane will release bubbles around the hose (big enough to see).
 - If there are no bubbles, your grill is safe to use.
- If there are bubbles, turn off the tank and check connections, then have your grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the leak doesn't stop, call the fire department immediately.

WHEN THE GRILL IS ON:

- As you are cooking, if you smell gas, turn off the gas tank and burners.
- If the leak stops immediately, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the smell continues, move away from the grill and call the fire department immediately. Do not move the grill.

CHARCOAL GRILLS:

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Following these tips will help ensure your summer cook outs are safe and enjoyable.

HYDRANT FLUSHING



Beginning on Tuesday, April 20, 2021 fire hydrants will be flushed in the service area of the Lehigh Water Authority—in Lehigh, Weissport and portions of Mahoning and Franklin Townships. Flushing will be done beginning at 8:00 A.M. and continue until around 3:00 P.M. each day until all hydrants are flushed. Hydrants will not be flushed on Monday's.

Water may be discolored for a short time. This discoloration is not harmful. It is suggested that at this time, you set aside water at night for drinking the next day.

Hydrant flushing is part of our normal operations, in order to keep the system clean for use of our customers.

LIGHT & POWER DEPARTMENT

The Superintendent announced the following 2021 Projects

- Route 443 reconstruction has begun, numerous poles will be relocated, new conductors will be installed. There will be power outages associated with this project and advanced notifications will be provided for planned outages. Traffic signals will be upgraded as part of the project, disruptions should be expected.
- Tree trimming will resume in Spring.
- New Hometown Hero banners will be installed and the existing ones will be removed.
- Vacuum breaker testing and maintenance is scheduled for February 8, 2021 and will be completed before the newsletter prints.
- Routine pole replacements and old pole removals will continue throughout the Borough.
- GIS upgrades are continuous and a work in progress.
- The fountain will be up and running in Spring.
- Replace poles and upgrade lights to LED at the Grove tennis courts.
- Actively working on the replacement transformers for the 69KV substation.

The Light & Power Department bucket trucks, digger truck, and rubber protective equipment will be ANSI inspected and dielectrically tested.

WHY DO WE HAVE A NEW TRASH RECYCLING PROVIDER?

Tamaqua Transfer was recently awarded the residential solid waste and recycling contract for the Borough of Lehighton for a 3 year term. Contracted services will include weekly trash and recycling collection. Trash and recycling totes are to be placed curbside on the evening prior to your collection day. We are pleased to work with Tamaqua Transfer to meet all of our residents garbage/recycling needs.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF MY TRASH/RECYCLING PICK-UP IS MISSED? WHAT SHOULD I DO IF MY TOTE IS LOST OR DAMAGED?

If your trash or recycling was missed, please call Tamaqua Transfer directly at 1-570-668-4515 or toll-free 1-866-337-1007. If your GARBAGE tote is lost or damaged, also contact Tamaqua Transfer directly. If your RECYCLING tote is lost or damaged, please contact the Lehighton Borough Secretary.

WHAT SHOULD I DO WITH MY YARD WASTE?

Each household is permitted up to 5 bags of yard waste OR 5 bundles of branches/brush, securely tied per week. Bags and bundles cannot weigh more than 35 pounds. Please place these next to the Tamaqua Transfer Black and Red Tote for pick-up.

WHAT ITEMS ARE NOT COLLECTED BY TAMAQUA TRANSFER?

The following items are not collected by Tamaqua Transfer, per the Garbage Contract; Building/Construction Materials, Tires, Hazardous Waste, Cooking/Motor Oil and Electronic Items.

MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEM (MS4)

Lehighton Borough is the owner of a municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) that discharges to surface waters of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Therefore, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA-DEP) requires that the Borough obtain and comply with the requirements of a NPDES General Permit (PAP-13).

A separate storm sewer system is a collection of structures, including retention basins, ditches, roadside inlets and underground pipes designed to gather stormwater from the built up areas and discharge it, without treatment, into local streams and rivers. It's called a separate system because it's not connected to the sanitary sewer system which drains waste water from inside a home to a sewage treatment facility or a private septic system.

Annually, Lehighton Borough submits an MS4 Annual Report Form which outlined the Borough's efforts to comply with the NPDES GP-13 requirements. The Borough follows the PA-DEP's 6 Minimum Control Measures (MCM's) protocols which include:

- Public Education and Outreach of Storm Water Impacts
- Public Involvement/Participation
- Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination
- Construction Site Storm Water
- Post-Construction Storm Water Management in New Development and Redevelopment
- Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping for Municipal Operations

All the soap, scum, and oily grit runs along the curb. Then into the storm drain and directly into our lakes, streams and into coastal waters including the Chesapeake Bay. And that causes pollution which is unhealthy for fish. So how do you avoid this whole mess? Easy. Wash your car on grass or gravel instead of the street. Or better yet, take it to a car wash where the water gets treated and recycled.

Because stormwater originates from all corners of a community, including the neighborhood where people live and work, increasing public stormwater awareness is considered very important. To achieve this goal, the Borough of Lehighton has developed community-wide education plans, including our website, social media and Newsletters, designed to inform residents about what stormwater is, why it requires management and the things they can do to make a difference.

The Borough has adopted and enforces a Stormwater Management Ordinance. All stormwater management plans are required to have engineering review and approval before approval of all new developments.

Lehighton Borough and the Carbon County Conservation District work together in reviewing and in the enforcement of erosions and sediment control measures. **If you think you have observed any erosion or sediment problem from any construction site, please call the Carbon County Conservation District.** The District will investigate these issues for the Borough and enforce the regulations as applicable.

If you have any other type of stormwater problem or concern, please call the Borough Office at 610-377-4002 to have it investigated. You will be required to give your name, address, telephone number where you can be contacted, along with the specific location and description of the problem.

THERE WILL BE AN MS4 PUBLIC HEARING ON JUNE 7, 2021 AT 7:00P.M. IN THE MUNICIPAL BUILDING.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

- Street Sweeping on First Street will begin the first Wednesday of March and continue every Wednesday until November 1, 2021. There will be no parking on First Street from 4:00am – 6:00am during this time, weather permitting
- For Street Sweeping on all other roads, please look for the temporary orange “No Parking” signs. Do not move vehicles back until the road has been swept and all signs have been taken down
- Please do not place any yard debris in the Street gutters. When it rains, this debris will block catch basins and cause ponding of water on roads
- When cutting grass, please do not blow or sweep grass into the streets
- A large, black dumpster will be placed behind the Public Works garage for yard waste beginning April 15 thru May 15, 2021. No branches larger than four (4) inches in diameter or bundles longer than four (4) feet in length may be placed in dumpster

2021 BUDGET


The final 2021 Budget, as adopted on December 21, 2020 sets the real estate taxes at a total of 9.5 mills with 2 mills allocated to the Fire Station Construction Fund, 1 mill for Fire Equipment and ½ mill for capital reserve for funding capital needs and large projects. The Borough also levies 6 mills for Occupation Taxes.

The 2021 Budget totals \$18,567,434.

Sewer Fund	\$ 3,735,174.99

Outdoor Safety

- » If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away.
- » Do not go under trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm.
- » Wait at least 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder before leaving your shelter.
- » Stay away from windows and doors. Stay off porches.
- » There is no safe place outside. Places with only a roof on sports fields, golf courses, and picnic areas are not safe during a lightning storm. Small sheds should not be used.
- » If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1. Get medical help right away.

Indoor Safety

Turn off computers. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other things that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. You can use a cell or cordless phone.

Do not wash your hands, bathe, shower, do laundry, or wash dishes.

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Who Needs Building Codes?

We all do – whether in our homes, offices, schools, stores, factories or places of entertainment. **We rely on the safety of structures that surround us in our everyday life.** The public need for protection from disaster due to fire, structural collapse and general deterioration underscores the need for modern codes and their administration. Most aspects of building construction (electrical wiring, heating, sanitary facilities) can represent a potential hazard to building occupants and users. **Building codes provide safeguards.** Although no code can eliminate all risks, reducing risks to an acceptable level helps.

Who is Lehigh Borough's Codes Enforcer?

Barry Isett and Associates, Inc. is the appointed Building Code Official, Zoning and Code Enforcement Officer for Lehigh Borough, appointed in 2013. As certified inspectors, our responsibility is the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the public by creating safe buildings and communities. This is accomplished through the enforcement of federal, state and local ordinances adopted by the Borough.

We take pride in providing a professional level of assistance to the community. Enforcement often begins with a written letter (Notice of Violation) to identify items that are out of compliance, the code requirement, a timeframe for completion and a fine if no action is taken to abate the issues. These items are required to be listed in the notice and may seem overwhelming and are often interpreted as demanding and offering no help. In fact, that is not the case. The Borough wants compliance with codes to ensure health and safety for the community. Isett will work with you throughout the process and provide guidance. Cooperation on your part is needed in order to achieve a successful completion of the project.

Property Maintenance and Quality of Life (QQL)

One of the Borough's highest priorities is to work with property owners and tenants to preserve and maintain the neighborhoods and commercial areas.
