Pledge of Allegiance

<u>Guest Speaker - Jerry McAward - Request for Support for the Francis E. Walter Dam Reservoir</u> Study

Jerry passed out a sample resolution and fact sheet on his request. The Army Corp is in a new partnership with the Delaware River Basin and New York City's DEP. They are funding a yearlong feasibility study that will examine different parameters. The argument is for the water supply. What Jerry handed out is information on the recreation side of the argument. The 3 likely outcomes will not, in his opinion, benefit downstream recreation. He thinks they will most likely be the following: building a much larger dam costing hundreds of millions of dollars, a new control tower used to determine when to draw down water and lastly and most talked about, New York City may make a bid to buy 15% of the capacity of the Francis Walter Dam there by controlling it.

Jerry said the flow management plan that currently exists with the Army Corp of Engineers has been used for the past 16 years and will be in direct opposition with the plan as it exists if New York City is awarded the 15% bid. Jerry and others like him are against any change. New York City, in their defense Jerry stated, has a 100 year forward look on water supply.

Jerry went on to say that allowing this to happen will affect not only the water supply for Pennsylvania but the downstream recreation that the borough is now part of. The proposed changes will affect the local economy to some degree as his business utilizes many of the businesses in the borough's downtown. He is hoping the borough will approve the resolution.

Councilor Saunders/Arner made the motions to approve the resolution pending the solicitor's approval and all were in favor with no questions or objections.

HEARING OF PERSONS PRESENT

Mr. Roy Christman, 6495 Pohopoco Drive wanted to address council on gerrymandering. He said the voters are supposed to pick their legislators. In gerrymandering, the legislators pick their voters. He said we can stop it. Pennsylvania is one of the worst states for gerrymandering. He believes Ohio and North Carolina are worse but we are in the top 5 states.

There is a group called Fair Districts Pennsylvania of which he is a member of and is representing tonight. He said they are going around to boroughs and townships asking them to pass a resolution opposing gerrymandering. So far, in Carbon County, the County have all passed a resolution. East Penn turned him down stating they did not think they were affected by gerrymandering. Mr. Christman thinks everyone is and the resolution is only asking for a nonpartisan commission to draw the lines. He feels this is the best year to do this because the Democrats control the Governor seat, the Republicans control the legislature and nobody knows how it will play out.

Curtis Keefer of 218 South 3rd Street wanted to address council about the safety of people. He said it sounds like he is complaining but he really isn't. He went on to say that when he moved here, he thought these people have it together where snow removal is concerned but it seems like it has deteriorated tremendously. The snow storm we had around Thanksgiving he saw nothing done. The other thing is, a few years ago there was a large snowfall. The plows came up 3rd Street and would turn around from his side of the street and come back down. The gentleman across the street insists on taking all the snow from his side of the street and moving it across the street to in from of Mr. Keefer's house. It wouldn't be so bad if this person wasn't throwing it in a fire hydrant zone. Mr. Keefer called the police. They spoke to the neighbor and left after a minute or two. The plow goes by and makes a 4-foot path in by the hydrant and comes back and this person stands in the middle of the street until the plow changed direction and put the snow in the middle of the street. The plow had to come back down again and dumped more snow into the fire hydrant zone. Mr. Keefer and another neighbor try to keep the hydrant open as much as possible but the guy across the street is a hazard. Mr. Keefer wanted to know if something could be done. APPROVAL OF MINUTES
